
Course Description:

In RWS 1301 Rhetoric and Composition I, students will develop effective communication and reasoning skills to be successful in all their social spheres: academic, professional, civic, and personal. This course is especially designed to help students more effectively express their thoughts in written form. To that end, the class will involve a considerable amount of writing and reading. Students will also learn about many composition concepts such as the rhetorical situation, the Aristotelian appeals, genres, and more. *Note: A grade of "C" or higher is required for this course to count toward prerequisite coursework.*


Learning Outcomes:

- Understand a theory of discourse communities.
- Engage as a community of writers who dialogue across texts, argue, and build on each other's work.
- Draw on existing knowledge bases to create "new" or "transformed" knowledge.
- Develop a knowledge of genres as they are defined and stabilized within discourse communities.
- Address the specific, immediate rhetorical situations of individual communicative acts.
- Develop procedural knowledge of the writing task in its various phases.
- Engage reflection about their own learning.
